There are so many people out there that just don't know where to turn. We don't counsel or offer advice, but we do listen and pray. We also can offer practical help as we are agents for the Chelmsford Food Bank and we have Co-op vouchers to give out if necessary.

As you know we lead a core leadership team consisting of Steve and Kathe, Chris and Debra. We meet most weeks to pray and plan, and every now and again we have a half day of prayer and fasting. At this point in time we are

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working on a 'Balanced Ministry Model'. More information will be given out over the coming weeks, but basically it looks at four areas of church, the Sunday service, Discipleship, Outreach, and Enablers that help it all fit together. Each section is divided into aims which are

then divided so that we can measure progress. This will all go on behind the scenes, but will result in a healthy and vibrant church.

Community Groups



Community Groups will continue to play a central role in the life of the church. They

are where community really happens. Our desire is to see as many people attending a group as possible, benefiting from the teaching, discipleship and fellowship.

As a leadership we have been developing values throughout the church. This involves expectations on the leadership, those with positions of responsibility and, in Community Groups on those attending.

These standards are hardly revolutionary and are common sense. As a group member you should:

- be willing to take an active part in group life
- seek to apply the teaching material to assist your growth as a Christian
- attend regularly for the period of

the course, letting your facilitator know when this isn't possible

- respecting the views of others – even when you think they are wrong. This means no quick answers, snap judgements, simple fixes – and definitely no 'bible bashing'!
- keep confidential what is shared within the Group
- avoid gossip within the group
- resolve differences by following the principles of Matthew 18
- be willing to invite and welcome new members
- make an effort to know other group members and prayerfully supporting them
- allowing other Group members to speak into your life and help you live a healthy, balanced spiritual life that is pleasing to God
- be willing, as appropriate, to not behave in any way that might cause another group member to stumble (in other words, being willing to limit our freedom for the sake of the Group).

Mission

The church will continue to support Basil and Kathy in Mumbai (and Jeevan Asher) and also a pastor in the Philippines. One-off gifts, such as our support for the work in Tanzania, are also likely to continue. Kathe and I hope, health permitting, to go overseas with Peter Butt's School of Ministry, teaching leaders overseas. I will also be exploring the possibility of visiting the persecuted Church with Open Doors. We shall also continue to be in touch with the Well of Living Water church in Izmail, Ukraine.

Our visit to Kosova last year is having an ongoing benefit for Smile Internationals work with widows and children. It has led to sponsoring children's education and school twinning. In addition Chairman is now a Christmas shoebox co-ordinator and Kathe a school rep for Smile.

Balanced Ministry Model

We are now working on, but have not finalised, a Balanced Ministry Model for 2013 – 2014. This looks at the whole church and assesses where we are now, and where we want to get to. Built into it is a strategy with S.M.A.R.T. goals, so that we can chart our progress.

We are looking at four aspects of church, each with several sub divisions.

So under Sundays we have the vision to create an environment of excellent welcome, worship and word through the regular gathering of the church, in and with the community. We see the key areas as the children's work, the welcome, growth and the worship team.

Each key area has a set of aims and the steps needed to reach and maintain the aim. This applies to all four aspects.

The next area is Discipleship with the vision to create a culture of growth and maturity, with training and equipping in which members of the church grow in their walk with Jesus.

The key areas are, Community Groups, Membership, Relationships and Maturity.

The next area is Outreach with the vision to create a culture of personal and corporate evangelism throughout the church membership.

The key areas are, Reaching the neighbourhood, Reaching those

who are living under difficult circumstances, Evangelism and our Overseas connections.

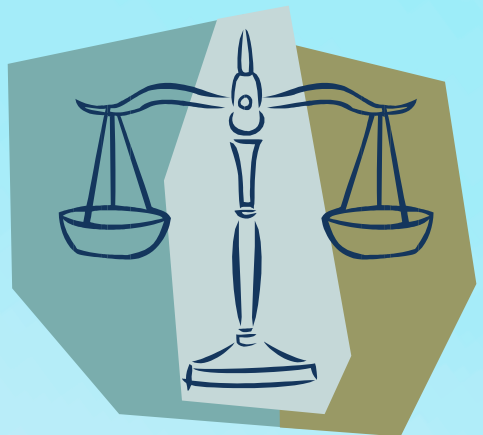
Finally we have the Enablers with the vision to create a culture where the ministry of the church can be facilitated well.

The keys areas are Finances, Prayer, Leadership and Communication.

This whole model is very much a work in progress, but we are meeting every week to put in place the final touches.

You may be asking what difference this will make to you. Well our intention is that as a church we can all grow together and be more effective in our own walk and be more effective in reaching others.

The overall priority is that we maintain a culture of worship, honour and blessing of our God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.
